LETTER FROM A CIVIL WAR SOLDIER

A copy of the following letter was found in documents donated to the Pulaski County Historical Society by Zera Hansell Howe. The letter is presented as it was written.

Camp near Harpers Ferrie, October 5th, 1862

My Dear Aunt,

I hav sat down to drop you a fiew lines in answer to your of 28 of last month which came to hand yesterday and you dont know how glad I was to receive it. It does me good to hear from you all.

You wanted to know If I could give you aney information of E (?) Wilkinson. I cannot giv aney more than I hav riten here to fore. I went all ove the Batel field and I could not find the remains of him aney where as to who Baried the dead I dont know aney of there names onley those that I took with myself and when we got out on the field there was a square of men that they call her in the army Pianeers whose business it is to Burie the dead after a Batel. And they had a great meney buried when we got to the field. We did not find aney of Company A's men but from what I could ascertain he was not in slaying they described to me that was where company A fought and they was both sargents which was Wm Alens(?) & Noal Aley. It might a ben that Elijah was wounded before he was taken and if he was Probly he is in there hands yet they hav some of our Regiment at Linet (?) Burg that is wounded and I heard again that there was some at Gordensville perhaps he is at one or the other places and meby he be a tendent on the wounded if he is not hurt himself. Our surgeon just came from Richmond a fiew days ago he ses that there is a good meney of our army that is there a great memey is a starving to death he was made a prisoner of war for awhile but not aney lenth of time he reports that they Prisoners is Treated hard and dont get much to eat he sed by hard barging one day he got the over seere of the Prison to bring him some soup whilst he was sturing it up he stured up two ded mise that had got in to the soup and he sad that it was just haf enough to feel the hair from the tails and legs he throwed loap mice bowl and all on the flower and he sed that the officer came and gav them a good cursing for it he sed that was the way the boys was treeted generally.

Anut Liza you dont hav aney idia how much hard suffering I have had to endure in the last three weeks all most night and day I had to go trying to make the Wounded Comfortable it all way falles to my lot to do the wounded up after the batel for one week I had nerely 300 wounds to address and you can guess how much time I had to sit down and mightly little help I had I got relieved last Thursday and then I came to the Redgement I suppose that you would lik to know what kind of a place I buried John in it is in a small grove of timber I dug a Grave about 3 ½ feet deep and layed him in it and ten I got some plank and sat up bey the side of him and took one and covered him with it and then I took and lay the durt over him this I done my self some of the seventh Ind Boys helped me cary him to his grave they helped me to dig the Grave and lay him in and then I done the rest my self. You may all think that it was Prety hard for a Brother to Burie a Brother But it is more Satisfaction To me and perhaps to all Inquiring friends for to know that he is dead and Buried than to not know wher he is I know where he now lays and I can rest at piece and know his fait.

Aunt I never saw a Pretyer smile on aney Bodies Countenance in my life than was on his he smiled as if the God of heaven had visit him in affecton

Captain sed to giv his love to you all & Father's familie to I have no War news to wright at this time for you can hear more of what is a going on than I can tell you you git the papers and regular

Aunt Liza I would like to see you all very much and eat peaches and apels and sagho Molasses with you and talk of things that I have Witness since I came to War

Aunt I think that you Folks out at home might send a poor boy in Maryland a can of nice Molasses I have not seen Samuel Waln For a long time the last time I saw him he was Fat and Looked well George Tincher he is well and (---) and all the rest of the Boys is well and so am I my self and Hope that these fiew lines may Find you all well I must close Giv my love to Grand Father and Grand Mother and all the rest of inquiring Friends Pleas Wright soon and often so no more but still Remain your dear Nephew until Death

David Hansell to Aunt Elizabeth J. Wilkinson and all the rest of the connetions and Friends

Note: David Hansell, writer of the letter, came home from the war, became a physician and died in 1934 in Parke Co., IN. John Hansell, the bother mentioned in the letter, is buried at Antietam National Cemetery.

Upper Tippecanoe River From Indiana Outfitters Website

The Tippecanoe River is considered the river of lakes. It is fed and nourished by eighty-eight natural lakes including some of the state's largest. It has a drainage area of approximately 1,900 square miles owing to the many small tributaries. Many lakes and swamps are the source of the tributaries, providing a more or less continuous flow of water. Each lake acts as a settling basin which reduces the amount of silt carried.

The gentle, 166 mile river is bordered for much of its length by green fields and forest as it meanders down from Tippecanoe Lake in Kosciusko County. This is the deepest lake in the state. There is good fishing and hunting to be found along the river's banks and in the many cold springs that bubble out of the high bluffs and banks. Several small green islands add to the natural beauty of the Tippecanoe River.

The water is amazingly clear and is generally muddy only after a storm. The Tippecanoe has an unusual profile in that its fall in the lower course greatly exceeds the fall in the upper course. This has resulted from the glacial drift material through which the river flows in the upper course.

The Tippecanoe River is a haven for warblers, redheaded woodpeckers, bobwhites and wild ducks. This quiet river surrounded by nature is enjoyed by sportsmen and others attracted by its environment. Also of interest are the many aquatic grasses which are unique to the Tippecanoe.

The river's energy was harnessed early to turn mill wheels which were used to grind wheat. Today man still harnesses its energy to provide electricity. Two large dams were built in the mid 1920's along and below Monticello and have created Lake Shafer and Lake Freeman. These



lakes, although designed for the creation of electricity, are use extensively for recreation. The river passes by the Potawatomi Village where the Indians in 1832 signed away for the last time their rights to Indiana soil. The Indians' great defeat to General William Henry Harrison in 1811 is marked by the Battleground Memorial.



Medaryville Herald 11 April 1957

Last Saturday, April 6---40 years after World War 1 was declared---a group of those veterans met at the VFW Post headquarters in Winamac to discuss the matter of recognition and grant of a pension for all World War 1 veterans and their widows and orphans and organized a barracks in a concerted drive with other of their buddies to urge upon Congress the need for passing such legislation.

Another meeting will be held Monday, April 15th, 8:00 o'clock p.m., at the VFW Post headquarters in Winamac and all War 1 veterans are urged to attend. Even as they joined hands to win the first World War, so will

World War 1 Vets Elect Slate To Push for Pension Benefits

The Medaryville Herald Thursday April 25, 1957

On April 15th veterans of World War 1 met again at the V.F.W. post headquarters in Winamac and organized in their fight for their separate recognition of service in 1917-1918. It is now forty years since they went into the service of their country to fight the first American War on foreign soil for the principles of freedom and democracy. Since their return in 1919 to re-establish themselves in civil life they have been given very little recognition in the form of allowances for their service. They have, however, continued their fight for democracy and were instrumental in obtaining privileges and right for future generations of veterans, particularly the World War 11 and Korean veterans, in the form of the recognition of the G. I. Bill of Rights. They themselves did not gain anything through this Bill and now, at an average of 62 years, they feel the need of compensation for themselves and have organized for the purpose of asking for recognition of their own rights and for a pension for all honorably discharged World War 1 veterans after the age of 60 years in the amount of \$100.00 per month.

In their organizing last Monday night they were issued a charter in the name of Pulaski County Barracks No. 883, Department of Indiana, Winamac, Veterans of World War 1 of the U.S.A., Inc.

The Officers serving for the year 1957 are as follows: Commander, Hugh C. Baker, Winamac; Sr. Vice Commander, Chauncey M. Felker, Winamac; Jr. Vice Commander, Roy W. Ballard, Medaryville; Quartermaster. Donald C. Boulden, Winamac; Adjutant, Harry G. Lund, Medaryville; Sgt.-at-Arms, Cloyd E. Jenkins, Francesville; Chaplain, William Mohr, Winamac; Judge Advocate, Clifford E. Olson, Medaryville; they have to join themselves together and win this--their last battle--to gain their wellearned rights and privileges. Trustees, Fred Stock, Star City; Flem May, Winamac; Jesse McGinnis, Medaryville. Meeting nights were arranged to be held at 8:00 o'clock on the second Monday of every month at the V.F.W. post headquarters in Winamac. The next meeting will be held on May 13, 1957. All honorably discharged veterans of World War 1 are asked to attend the next meeting or get in touch with one of the above named officers and sign up. If you cannot come in, drop a line and they will call on you. This is a call to arms for the last battle of World War 1 veterans. Sign up and do your bit.

Return from the Mexican Border

Medaryville Advertiser Thursday March 15, 1917

After a service of nine months on the Mexican border, the Winamac militia company, better known as Company L, are home again. The First regiment, of which the Winamac company is a unit, were mustered out of the Federal service early Wednesday morning at Fort Benj. Harrison in Indianapolis, and their coach was attached to a Pennsylvania train at Indianapolis, arriving in Winamac at 3:45 p.m.

About two thousand of the the citizens of Winamac and surrounding communities, headed by the G.A.R, and the Winamac Band, met the train at the station and welcomed the boys home amid cheering and shouting. A big parade was formed and marched about the business district, ending at the armory, where the company deposited their equipment and were then marched to the Christian church and treated to a sumptuous dinner. The soldiers were all looking fine with the exception of John Agnew, who was walking with a cane, as a result of a sprained ankle.

Last night the citizens of Winamac gave the company a reception at the Gorrell Hall and the occasion was notable for much speech making.

Winamac Had An Armory?

Pulaski County Democrat January 20, 1916

The militia company has moved its armory from the third story of the opera house block to the basement of the Keller block, under the Keller clothing store. The vibration caused by the men drilling made the third story room undesirable. The basement room has been fitted up in nice shape, with modern conveniences. The regular meetings on Wednesday nights have been well attended, and the drill sergeant from the regular army who is here conducts a school and squad drills on other nights. It is hoped that the guns, suits and other equipment will arrive before long.

Pulaski County Democrat May 25, 1916

Prospects are favorable for the erection of a real armory for the Winamac militia company within the near future. While the present armory in the basement of the Keller block is convenient as to location and is more or less commodious, it is too small for the purpose. So the matter has been taken up with F.M. Williams, who has in turn corresponded with Adjutant General Bridges of Indianapolis, and letters exchanged this week indicate that the desire for a larger building may be realized.

The idea is to erect a suitable structure of concrete blocks on the former Ferd [sic] Kandler lot on Pearl Street between Monticello and Front streets. Tentative plans provide a drill room 40x80 feet, with suitable

The location is now Pearl Street between Monticello and Riverside. Currently, fronting Monticello, are Tippy's to the north and the ISIS Theater to the south. Fronting Pearl are the Post Office, a home, and VPS Auto Body on the north, and a row of houses on the south.

Was the building ever built?





Renovation is the responsibility of the Town of Winamac, the owner of the bridge. The bridge is currently closed while repairs are underway. Repairs include stripping & repainting, concrete work, and resetting the decking.



Illumination is the goal of the Memorial Swinging Bridge Project, a volunteer group whose sole purpose is to light the bridge to honor the veterans of Pulaski County. This work will start in the spring. Lights will be turned on during a dedication and celebration that will be held on the evening of July 3, 2023.



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
