

The Winamac Journal March 24, 1883

Mr. N. B. Barron, the reliable and efficient pension and bounty agent, of Logansport, has secured pensions for a large number of Pulaski county soldiers. The last one is a pension for Jasper N. Brown, of Winamac, who was a member of Co G, 51st Ind regiment. He will receive \$4 per month, dating from November 12, 1864, which will aggregate about \$900.

ALFRED J. HARTWICK, Field Artillery, Hospital Corps No. 54: died from pneumonia at Mesves Hosiptal Center, France, September 13, 1918.

RALPH C. KELLER, Co. D, 127th Reg., 32d Div.: killed in action October 19, 1918.

LESLIE H. KOSTER, National Army, Provost Guard Co.: died from pneumonia at Camp Taylor, Ky., October 12, 1918.

EVERETT E. KNEBEL, Co. E, 207th Infantry: wounded in action and died from pneumonia at Mesves Hospital Center, France, December 21, 1918.

LOUIS A. KRIPISCH, 38th Radio Co., U.S. Marines, American Legation, Pekin, China: died from pneumonia at Pekin, China, February 18, 1920.

WILLIAM McKINLEY, Co. I, 18th U.S. Infantry: killed in action at Argonne, France, October 4, 1918.

HERMAN C. MALCHOW, Co. C, 364th Infantry: wounded October 7, 1918, and died in France October 10, 1918.

OLLIE NICKERSON, died from automobile accident at Camp Merritt, New Jersey, April 28, 1919.

MARTIN J. O'BRIEN, Co. A, 2d Reg. Ordnance Training Dept.: died from pneumonia at Camp Hancock, Ga., January 8, 1919.

ADOLPH G. OLSON, Co. C, 5th Limited Service Regiment: died from pneumonia at Camp Grant, Ill., October 6, 1918.

RAYMOND PFOST, Co. F, 162d Infantry, A.E.F.: killed in action in France, July18, 1918.



MILITARY MOMENT

Pulaski County Democrat April 9, 1903

Charles Umphrey, an aged resident of Van Buren township, died Monday at the home of his son John, from diseases incident to old age. His age was eighty-seven years, and he had been a resident of the county for many years. He was a veteran of both the Mexican and Civil Wars, and was well known all over that corner of the county. The funeral was held at Thornhope yesterday.

Last month in **Military Moment**, we had this to say about a veteran, from The Winamac Journal March 24, 1883: Mr. N. B. Barron, the reliable and efficient pension and bounty agent, of Logansport, has secured pensions for a large number of Pulaski county soldiers. The last one is a pension for Jasper N. Brown, of Winamac, who was a member of Co G, 51st Ind

regiment. He will receive \$4 per month, dating from November 12, 1864, which will aggregate about \$900.

We received the following from David Budd.

Here is a photo of Jasper Brown, who you mention in your newsletter. He was my great-great grandfather. His daughter, Emma, married Frank Agnew. They were my Mom's mother's parents. I think my girls and I are his only descendants still living in Pulaski County.

Jasper's Co G of the 51st was from Cass County. He lived near Metea and moved to Winamac after the war. The 51st was part of "The Lightning Mule Brigade". A colossal failure, but an interesting footnote in Civil War history.

Jasper is buried near the crypt east of Spangler Hill.

Military History Moment

From PROGRESS OF PULASKI COUNTY, Pulaski County Centennial August 17 - 20, 1939, Ten Decades of Development.

The Early Years

The first military organization in Pulaski county of which there is any record was organized about the year 1842 or '43, when a company known as the "Winamac Rifle Rangers" was formed at the county seat. Rufus Brown was captain, Stephen Bruce first lieutenant, Frederick Klinger second lieutenant, Job Holmes ensign. Some of the parades of the company were popular attractions. But after a short time the interest waned, and nothing more in the

military line was done until the Mexican war broke out in 1846, when efforts were made to get up another organization. But this failed.

So far as known, no man then a resident of Pulaski county served in the Mexican war. Companies were organized at Logansport and at Crown Point, and it is presumed that these contained some men who had lived in this county before that time, although not residents when they enlisted. Numerous men who served in the Mexican war moved to Pulaski county afterwards. Among such whose names have been recalled are John P. Liming, Zemariah Williamson, Peter Lane, O. H. P. Grover, Charles Humphrey, J. B. Agnew Sr., John Hodges, E. P. Potter, Charles Hathaway, G. H. Barnett, Francis H. Snyder, a Mr. Updegraff and a Mr. Phipps.


In 1852 the state legislature ordered that each congressional district should organize its militia, and the auditor of this county, by direction of the commissioners, secured from Indianapolis the quota of arms due the county under the law. A company was formed - perhaps more than one - but in four or five years the movement was again abandoned, and the muskets were returned to the state capital. After the war of the rebellion, which will be mentioned [in a later newsletter], there was a subsequent reorganization of the militia here in 1876, when more arms were secured from the state, but again the movement lasted only about three years. In 1898, when war was declared against Spain, a volunteer company was organized in Winamc and the men went to Indianapolis, but the company did not have the required number and was not mustered in.



The War Of The Rebellion, Part 1

Part 2 will appear in the May E-Newsletter.

Pulaski county, like others all over the country, was much concerned in the events leading up to the war of the rebellion, and there was a sharp division of sentiment upon the question of states' rights and secession. The fall of Fort Sumter came as a distinct shock, and within a week after the news was received a meeting was held in the court house at Winamac to consider the president's call for 75,000 men. It is said that about 400 people assembled - quite a crowd for that day - and speeches were made by Dr. F. B. Thomas, James W. Eldridge, Byron T. Lane, W. C. Barnett, H. P. Rowan, A. I. Gould, W. S. Huddleston Sr., Stephen Bruce and others. A committee was appointed to draft resolutions, which expressed loyalty and determination, although there were some at the meeting who sincerely felt that the north was exceeding its rights.

Within another week about fifteen men left the county to join the 9th regiment at Logansport, for three months' service. During the next few weeks about as many more three months men went from this county. It was the general belief at that time that the rebellion would be brought to a close by the three months men, and there was no organized effort at enlistment until the fall of 1861, when Dr. F. B. Thomas was commissioned to raise a company for three years' service. Meetings were held all over the county, and the company was quickly raised. Dr. Thomas was elected captain, George Burson first lieutenant, and James Brown second lieutenant. It was known as Co. H of the 46th Indiana, and was ordered to the front soon after being mustered in on November 5.



We won't share electrical specifications, leaving that to the experts. But if you thought we were "stringing holiday lights" on the bridge, think again!

Verticals & Cables

The computer-managed lighting system on the suspension and suspender cables will have the ability to glow in multiple colors.

They are hooded LED lights and have a rated

life of 50,000 hours. That's about ten to eleven years averaging twelve hours per night, but they won't be on for more than five to seven hours a night. They carry a five-year warranty.



Towers & Underneath

Computer-managed, these lights will have the ability to glow in multiple colors.

The fixtures have a rated life of 150,000 hours. That's about twenty-five to thirty years averaging twelve hours per night, but they won't be on for more than five to seven hours per night. They carry a five-year warranty.

The War Of The Rebellion, Part 2

Previous to and during [the organization of a Pulaski county company], however, a number of men left Pulaski county to join companies and regiments organized at other places. The county was comparatively small in point of population, and could not furnish many full companies, so volunteers hastened to other points and were credited to other counties, while in reality they belonged to Pulaski. At the reorganization of the 9th (which the first fifteen volunteers from here had joined [in Logansport]), it is said that fully seventy members were from Pulaski County.

During the summer of 1862 recruiting officers from other parts of the state visited the county, and "war meetings" were held in towns and school houses. Men went from here to enter various regiments. Dr.

and inspiring addresses were delivered by Rev. George Cramer and Rev. J. C. Whitt.

Pulaski County Democrat: Francesville column June 5, 1902 James W. Selders of Winamac was authorized to raise a company, and was commissioned captain.

A gentleman who made close inquiry into the matter in the early eighties estimated that Pulaski county furnished 1166 men to the army of the North during the civil war, including about 100 men who had left this county to enlist elsewhere.

There were Pulaski county men in the 9th, 12th, 13th, 15th, 17th, 20th, 26th, 29th, 42nd, 46th, 48th, 63d, 87th, 127th, 128th, 132d and 151st.

But two full companies were organized in the county. They were Co. H of the 46th and Co. B of the 87th.

Of Co. H the captains were F. B. Thomas, George Burson, James W. Brown and James F. Mitchell. Captains of Co. B were James W. Selders, George W. Baker and WIlliam W. Agnew.

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

Hoosiers at War: An Overview of Indiana during World War II

The Memorial Swinging Bridge was dedicated to persons serving in the military from Pulaski County, but all of those persons also lived in Indiana. The following article was found on the in.gov website and was written by James Madison.

World War II changed everything in Indiana, sometimes temporarily, sometimes permanently. The necessities of war--the overwhelming need to defeat the Axis--set the boundaries that shaped lives. The oft-repeated question, "Don't you know there's a war on?," was really a statement. Everyone knew.

The lives most disrupted by war were those of the Hoosier men and women who served in the military forces. Long weeks of hard training in dusty military camps were a prelude to travels and challenges spread across the country and around the world. Far from home, young soldiers could only dimly remember when life included lazy front-

BEFORE THE BRIDGE...

Pedestrians crossed from town to the peninsula (first, Nye Park, then the Park Association's river park) via fords or temporary wooden bridges. The bridges would be placed "in season" at one ford or another. The fords - and bridges - were typically placed at the foot of Pearl Street or Main Street. As we know, the bridge was eventually situated at the foot of Main Street.

The postcard below, found online at The Indiana Album (which encourages use of their photos) shows the "Perl [sic] St. ford." The postcard is postmarked November 25, 1908.

Company To Mexican Border




This handsome gentleman served in World War I. His photo is in the Courthouse, but it does not bear a name.

During the latter part of the year 1915 a group of Winamac men became active in the formation of a unit of the Indiana National Guard. The organization, known as Company L, First Indiana Infantry, was mustered into service by Col. George Freyermuth on December 21, 1915. William S. Huddleston Jr. was elected captain; John G. Capouch, first lieutenant; Jerry G. Bostick, second lieutenant.

When trouble with Mexican bandits threatened to disrupt peace between the United States and Mexico during the summer of 1916 the Company was called into active service and sent to a camp near Brownstown, Texas, where it remained on guard duty for about eight months. The order to call the company into camp in Winamac was received by Captain Huddleston on June 19, 1916. The organization entrained on June 23 for Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indiana, where it remained until July 11, reaching its destination in Texas on July 16. A number of men, particularly married ones, were honorably discharged from the Company during the next few months and returned home. The others remained until spring, reaching Winamac on the return trip March 14, 1917.



Winamac Militia members gathered for this photo in June 1916. Many of these same men reported for duty the following spring, when the United States joined The Great War.



What Do You Mean? Lights?

The computer-managed lighting system on the suspension and suspender cables will have the ability to glow in multiple colors. They are hooded LED lights and have a rated life of 50,000 hours. That's about ten to eleven years averaging twelve hours per night, but they won't be on for more than five to seven hours a night.

The lights on the towers and underneath the bridge will have a rated life of 150,000 hours. That's about twenty-five to thirty years averaging twelve hours per night, but again, they won't be on for more than five to seven hours per night. All of the lighting fixtures carry a five-year warranty.
