1886 - 1899

Jul 3 1886: The work on the new iron bridge across the river at this place was completed on Wednesday. All the crossing of the river during the repairs was at the foot of Pearl street.

Aug 5, 1892: The foot bridge across the river to the park was put up last week. The sand in the river bottom caused the walk to settle unevenly and it was moved the first of the week to more solid bottom a little up stream.

May 12 1899: J.C. Nye is enclosing four acres of the park with a fence to exclude cattle. Inside the enclosure the grass will be kept down with a one-horse lawn mower. Incandescent sparks will light the building and grounds, city water will be piped there, and entrance will be by a foot bridge across the river east of the artesian well.

A permanent footbridge across the river, from the town's little park below the artesian well to the Association park on the peninsula, is practically secured followed [sic] meetings sharing the past week by directors of the Park Association, members of the town council and representatives of the Kiwanis club.

The matter was formally taken up at a park board meeting last Thursday evening, when it was proposed that that organization would finance the project if the town would assure to pay one half the cost within the next couple of years. At Monday night's meeting of the council this proposition was accepted, paving the way for what is expected to be final action at another meeting of the park board tonight.

Ttay Tafe We'll Get Through This

April 12, 1923

The contract for the construction of the proposed footbridge across the river, from the park below the artesian well to the Association park, was let last Friday night to R.E. Nutt. His was the only bid, at \$3,197.

The matter had been held in abeyance pending the sale of sufficient stock in the park association to provide money for the improvement. Recent sales of stock to the amount of \$2,300 were reported, which, together with the \$1,000 previously agreed to be paid by the town council, placed the directors of the organization in position to close the contract.

The bridge is to be completed by July 1, according to the contract. The Winamac Cement Products Co. is to do the concrete work, and expects to begin operations as soon as the river falls enough to permit.


Exemption Board Approved

Following a lapse of several Fourth celebrations in Winamac without fireworks, arrangements have been made this year for what is expected to be the most elaborate display of pyrotechnics ever shown here. The committee in charge has purchased a complete display, to be set off as outlined in a pre-arranged schedule.

The display will be fired along the south side of the base ball park, thus enabling spectators to use the grandstand. The program includes a band concert preceding the fireworks.

Upon request of Brigadier General Gignilliat, who is to dedicate the memorial Bridge, an invitation is being issued to all Gold Star Mothers of the county to attend the exercises in a body. Clerk Ale, as clerk of the conscription board, has finished numbering all registered men in the county, giving each a new number, which number will tell the tale as to whether each man is drafted or not, when the drawing takes place at Washington. Every registered man in the county has a separate number, and his number is posted at the clerk's office. Following the drawing of the drafted numbers at Washington the county board will make exemptions as far as their authority extends and a higher board will then pass on appeals and occupation exemption claims. The last number on the Pulaski county list is 980. About 140 numbers will be drawn for this county before exemptions are passed on by the board.


July 5, 1923

Yesterday's celebration of the Fourth in Winamac was one of the most successful affairs of the kind ever held here. The crowd was one of the largest ever seen here on such an occasion, the weather was ideal, the program was carried out with but few disappointments, not an accident marred the day's events, and there was no disturbance of any kind.

The parking space in the Association park was literally covered with automobiles; hundreds of cars were parked in town and in the town park at the artesian well, the occupants going to the big park by way of the new suspension bridge, and during the evening the roads were lined with cars bringing in people for the night fireworks.

The dedication of the new bridge as a memorial to Pulaski county soldiers who served in the wars gave to the occasion a patriotic touch of deep significance. In the presence of a group of gray haired veterans of the Civil War, of a number of Gold Star Mothers and of an assemblage of veterans of the World War, Major General Gignilliat of Culver Military Academy delivered a brief address to a huge crowd that assembled near the east end of the bridge.





Block In Cemetery Given For Soldier Dead

Through the kindness of W. R. Jones, of this place, all soldiers from here who die in the military camps or those who will be brought back later from France, should the deaths occur over there, are to be buried in a block in the cemetery east of town. Through this arrangement, Privates Leslie Koster and Jesse Howard Engle now repose in this spot. Later a monument is to be placed there, beautifully inscribed with the names of the boys who have died in the service.

Pertinent information: Jesse Engle died 10 Oct 1918 of pneumonia at San Antonio, Leslie Koster died 12 Oct 1918 of pneumonia at Camp Taylor, Herman Malchow, another veteran from the Francesville area could have been buried here (killed in France 12 Oct 1918), however, he is buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

John Shirtz, a veteran, is buried at this spot also, but he didn't die until 1937.

The above mentioned monument to these veterans was never erected.

August 9, 1934

At the August meeting of the Town Board Monday night an emergency ordinance was passed making it "unlawful for any person to shake by grasping the cable or hand rail jump up and down upon or otherwise cause unnecessary vibration of the suspension Memorial bridge over the Tippecanoe river."

Violators will be fined not to exceed \$25.

This is a good move on the part of the Town Board as numerous boys and young men have been in the habit of indulging in the dangerous practice of shaking the bridge.

Historical Society receives grant from the Efroymson Family Fund

PRESS RELEASE SEPTEMBER 1 2020: The Pulaski County Historical Society received word it has been awarded a \$6,000 grant from the Efroymson Family Fund. The fund provides financial support to a diverse range of issues including arts and culture, historic preservation, the environment and helping those in need. This grant was awarded to support refurbishing the historic Memorial Swinging Bridge, a well-known feature of the Winamac Town Park.

The bridge is one of only a few suspension bridges of its type in the state. From *The Winamac Republican*, March 1, 1923, comes an article about a "new foot-bridge" to span the Tippecanoe River. The Park Association proposed to construct a "permanent suspension foot-bridge" over the Tippecanoe River to connect the artesian well park with the river park. Plans proceeded, and, in what today would seem record time, the bridge was dedicated to great fanfare just four months later, on July 4, 1923. The dedication was in memory of "soldiers of all wars who hailed from Pulaski County."

Ryan Harrison, President of the Historical Society, stated, "We are pleased the Efroymson family thought highly of the project. As we approach the bridge's centenary anniversary, it's gratifying to see a community coalition come together. This is one small step toward the goal."

And it truly is a community effort. The grant was secured with the aid of Indiana Landmarks. The Historical Society, a member agency, is acting as a pass-through entity. In a nod to the Town of Winamac's plans to refurbish the bridge, the Town will be the sub-recipient of the funds. In tandem with the Town, and in advance of the 100th anniversary of the bridge's dedication, a citizen group is working toward the goal of illuminating the bridge with LED lighting.




Winamac Militia Volunteer Company

Hundreds of veterans, students, and community members are expected to converge on Downtown Winamac this morning to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I. Winamac High School is teaming up with the Town of Winamac, the Pulaski County Public Library, and several other groups for the Veterans Day Celebration.

It starts at 9:00 a.m. EST with a program at Winamac Middle School. After that, a procession will set off for the Pulaski County Courthouse, heading west on Superior Street then north on Market Street. School officials say it will include more than 300 students and faculty members and block formations led by veterans from World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Desert Storm, and Afghanistan, as well as current veterans.

A ceremony is expected to begin at the memorial on the northwest corner of the courthouse lawn at 9:55. The procession will then move to the Winamac Town Park, where a closing ceremony will take place at the Memorial Bridge, also called the "swinging bridge," at about 10:40. Veterans will then have a chance to eat lunch with the students at the high school.

School officials say a number high school of classes have worked together to research and create a biography of all 500-plus Pulaski County World War I veterans, with help from County Historian Karen Fritz and Sue Caldwell from the Indiana Genealogical Society.

The county commissioners formally approved the use of the courthouse lawn when they met Monday. Main Street will be closed to traffic between Market Street and U.S. 35 during the event.

The actual centennial of the end of World War I is this Sunday. Some government offices will be closed Monday, in observation of the Veterans Day holiday.

JOHN M. AGNEW, Volunteer Co. L, Indiana National Gurad: died from pneumonia on English ship "Delta" en route to France, October 18, 1918; buried at sea.

ALBERT T. ANDERSON 15th Co., 4th Field Battery: died from pneumonia at Camp Taylor, Ky., April 25, 1918.

ROME ANTROBIUS, Co. H, 39th Infantry, 4th Division: killed in action August 4, 1918.

ROBERT E. BENNETT, Battery D, 35th Field Artillery: died from pneumonia at Camp IVAN E. BROWN, Co. F, 309th Infantry: missing in action near Preny, France, September 26, 1918.

THOMAS V. BUDD, fireman in Navy: died from pneumonia at Naval Hospital, Philadelphia, March 11, 1918.

GEORGE W. CRIM, Co. A, 9thSquadron, A.E.F.: died from pneumonia in France, September 29, 1918.

HARRY E. CRAMER, Tank Corps: died from pneumonia at Camp Colt, Pa., September 29, 1918. HENRY DRAKE, Co. G, 115th Infantry: killed in action October 27, 1918.

Jesse H. Engle, Co. C, unassigned: died from pneumonia at College Station, Texas, October 10, 1918.

FRANK FALVEY, 309th Engineers: died from pneumonia at Brest, France, April 12, 1918.

OSCAR C. HELM, Co. D, 16th Infantry: wounded in action while in France and died in U.S. Hospital at Baltimore, Md., April 27, 1919. McClellan, Ala., October 22, 1918.

An overwhelming number of servicemen from The Great War died of pneumonia and related diseases during the 1918 Pandemic. Read about it **in this post**.
